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Floor. Harris (1868-1947), a lawyer, was the founder of Rotary, the first and most international service club in the world. Rotary is an organization of business and professional leaders, united around the world, who provide humanitarian services, promote high ethical standards in all professions and help build goodwill and world peace. Born in Rasin, Wisconsin, USA on April 19, 1868, Paul was the second of six children of George N. Harris and Cornelia Brian Harris. At the age of 3, he moved to Wallingford, Vermont, where he grew up in the care of his paternal grandparents. Married to Gene Thompson Harris (1881-1963), they had no children. He received a bachelor's degree from the University of Iowa and a bachelor's degree in honor from the University of Vermont. Paul Harris worked as a newspaper reporter, business teacher, actor, cowboy, and traveled extensively around the U.S. Europe, selling marble and granite. In 1896 he went to Chicago to practice law. One evening Paul went with a professional friend to his country house. After dinner, walking around the neighborhood, Paul's friend introduced him to various merchants in their shops. It reminded Paul of his New England village, and he came to know: Why not have a scholarship consisting of businessmen from different professions, without restrictions of politics or religion? On February 23, 1905, Paul Harris founded the first club with three other businessmen: Sylvester Schiele, a coal trader, Gustav Lauer, mining engineer, and Hiram Shorey, a trading tailor. Paul Harris named the new Rotary Club because members met in rotation at various business locations. Membership in the club grew rapidly. Many members were from small towns and at the Rotary Club they found an opportunity for camaraderie. When Paul Harris became club president in his third year, he was convinced that the Rotary Club could be developed into an important service movement and sought to extend Rotary to other cities. The second Rotary Club was founded in San Francisco in 1908. In August 1910, when there were 16 clubs, the National Association of Rotary Clubs was organized. When the clubs were formed in Canada and the United Kingdom, the name was changed to the Rotary International Club Association in 1912 and then reduced to Rotary International in 1922. Paul Harris was the first president of the National Association and the International Association. As Rotary covered the globe, branches were opened in Europe and Asia. In 1932, the Four Way Test was created. Two world wars changed the face of Rotary and Eastern Europe was closed to Rotary until 1989, when clubs were re-established in Poland and Hungary. In 1990, the first club was opened in the Soviet Union. Rotary began with a vision of one man - Paul. Harris. Paul Harris was 3 years old around the time he moved into his grandparents' home. Harris was born on April 19, 1868, in Rasin, Wisconsin. At the age of 3, he moved to Wallingford, Vermont, where he grew up in the care of his paternal grandparents. He studied at the University of Vermont and Princeton University and received a law degree from the University of Iowa in 1891. In 1896, Harris settled in Chicago and opened a law practice. Four years later, he met with fellow attorney Bob Frank over dinner on Chicago's North Side. They strolled around the area, stopping in shops along the way. Harris was impressed that Frank was friendly with many shopkeepers. He hasn't seen such camaraderie among businessmen since moving to Chicago and asks if there's a way to guide him because it reminded him of growing up in Wallingford. The thought persisted that I was experiencing only what happened to hundreds, perhaps thousands, of other people in the great city. ... I was sure there must be many other young people who came from farms and small villages to establish themselves in Chicago. ... Why not put them together? If others wanted to communicate as much as I did, something would come out of it. Jean and Paul Harris board a ship after visiting Rotary members in Bermuda, 1925. Harris eventually convinced a few partners to discuss forming an organization for local professionals. On February 23, 1905, Harris, Gustav Lauer, Sylvester Schiele and Hiram Shorey gathered at Lauer's office in downtown Chicago for the first meeting of the Rotary Club. In February 1907, Harris was elected the third president of the Rotary Club in Chicago. Towards the end of his presidency, he worked to expand the Rotary out of the city. Some members of the club resisted, not wanting to take on the additional financial burden. But Harris persisted, and by 1910 Rotary had spread to several other major U.S. cities. Harris acknowledged the need to form a national association with the executive board of directors. In August 1910, the Rotarians held their first national convention in Chicago, where 16 existing clubs merged into the National Association of Rotary Clubs (now Rotary International). The new association unanimously elected Harris as its president. At the end of his second term as president, Rotary Harris resigned, citing poor health and the demands of his professional practice and personal life. In the mid-1920s, Harris became active in Rotary again, acting as a public person of the organization. To promote membership and service, he attended conventions and visited clubs around the world, often accompanied by his wife, Jin. Harris died on January 27, 1947, in Chicago at the age of 78 after a long illness. Before his death, he let him know that he preferred contributions to the Rotary Foundation instead of flowers. By coincidence, in the days before his death, Rotary leaders committed to a major fundraising effort for the Foundation. After news of his death, Rotary created the Paul Harris Memorial Fund as a way to request these donations. Rotarays were asked to pay tribute to the late Rotary founder by contributing to a fund that would be used for purposes dear to Harris's heart. In the 18 months since his death, the Rotary Foundation received \$1.3 million, helping to support the Foundation's first program, a postgraduate scholarship abroad. Paul Harris's lawyers were business friends, not social friends, but this experience made him wonder why he couldn't make social friends, at least from his business friends - and he decided to set up a club that would bring together a group of representative business and professional men in friendship and communication. Harris is a lawyer who wanted to capture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. Over the next few years, he devoted a lot of time to thinking about living and business conditions, and by 1905 he had formulated a certain philosophy of business relations. Talking about this with three of his legal clients - Sylvester Schiele, a coal trader, Gustav Lauer, a mining engineer, and Hiram Shorey, a trading tailor - he decided to organize with them the club he had planned since 1900. Paul Harris founded the world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, was formed on February 23, 1905. The first four Rotarians were: Gustav Lauer, Sylvester Schiele, Hiram Stchori, and Paul. Harris When Paul. Harris called Rotary's first meeting on February 23, he was in Room 711 of the Unity Building in Chicago. Paul Harris foresaw a professional club that would bring together men from different professions. The first members of the Rotary, Gustav Lauer, Hiram Shorey and Sylvester Schiele, attended this first meeting. This first meeting laid the groundwork for the world's first club service: The Rotary Club's Chicago Rotary name, stemming from the early practice of rotating meetings between members of the offices of the 1907 Rotary Club of Chicago performed its first act of community service. The club called a meeting of community organizations to establish a committee to install city comfort stations or public toilets to improve sanitation. Like my fellow members, I learned to focus on giving rather than getting, Paul Harris later wrote in his book This Rotarian Age Paul Harris wanted back in 1905 to capture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. Today, there is an organization of business and professional leaders around the world that provides humanitarian services and promotes high ethical standards in all professions. At the time of writing in 2009, more than one million people had been recognized as Paul Harris Fellows - people who gave \$1,000 to the Rotary International Foundation's Annual Fund program or were that amount promoted on their behalf with 1.2 million rotaries belonging to more than 32,000 Rotary clubs in more than 200 countries and in 1989, the Rotary Organization voted to recognize women in clubs around the world and now claims that more than 145,000 female members in its ranks since the time when Paul Harris headed the Rotary Club of Chicago's first act of community service back in 1907 Rotarians have taken on an active role in their communities while significantly enriching their personal and professional lives. When Paul Harris died on January 27, 1947, and was honorary president of Rotary International. While Paul Harris devoted most of his time to Rotary, he was also prominent in civilian and professional work. He was the first chairman of the board of the National Society of Mutilated Children and Adults in the United States and the International Society of Mutilated Children. He was a member of the Board of Governors of the Chicago Bar Association and its representative at the International Congress of Law in The Hague, as well as a member of the Committee of the American Bar Association.
